Documentary on Torture Available to Churches

The 2005 Rocky Mountain Conference Session approved AC18, "Condemnation of Use of Torture By American Military and Intelligence Agencies," which begins, "Following our Social Principles (Par. 164A of the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church), the Rocky Mountain Annual Conference declares its opposition to the use of torture by United States Military and Intelligence Agencies..."

In a nationwide project called "Spotlight on Torture," the National Religious Campaign Against Torture (NRCAT) has arranged for DVD copies of a documentary entitled "Ghosts of Abu Ghraib" to be available to 950 congregations, on a first-come, first-served basis during the week of October 21-28. Within those two weeks, congregations can choose the date and time they wish to schedule a screening and discussion.

"Ghosts of Abu Ghraib," an 80-minute HBO film, features the familiar and very disturbing pictures of torture at Iraq's Abu Ghraib prison and raises many questions: How did torture become an accepted practice at Abu Ghraib? Did U.S. government policies make it possible? How much damage has the aftermath of Abu Ghraib had on America's credibility as a defender of freedom and human rights around the world? Acclaimed filmmaker Rory Kennedy looks beyond the headlines to investigate the psychological and political context in which torture occurred.

Ice Makers Available

David Foth is a member of Hope UMC in Greenwood Village and works for an ice making company. They have commercial ice machines (testing units) to donate to non-profits. An ice bin is all that is required to make these units operational. Are there folks with connections to soup kitchens, church camps, etc., who might be able to use one of these? The units include one that produces about 800 lbs. per day and another that produces 1000 lbs. per day. Both are 30 inches wide which is a standard industry width for storage bins. The caveat is that the machines will need an ice storage bin to sit on top of that will cost \$300 to \$500, unless the ice machine is replacing an older, failing unit.
