Conference News and Resources

T2 E-newsletter to Ease Transition from Apportionments to Tithing

Tithe Transitions (T2), an E-newsletter to prepare the Rocky Mountain Conference membership for the new tithing apportionment system that was adopted at June's Annual Conference session, has been coming out each Tuesday since September 11. These communications will continue until February, when the first new reports are due to the Conference office. They will also be available at the Conference web site. Interim Conference Treasurer Paul Dirdak hopes that as church treasurers, finance committee chairs and other congregation leaders receive these communications the rationale for the new method will become clear and the process even clearer.

So far, the first two T2 editions have focused on the newsletter itself and tithing. Some excerpts:

"...by the fifteenth of every month, each local church treasurer shall remit to the annual conference 10% (+1%) of the previous month's net contributions."

"We hope that you will look forward to these communications. They will be short. They will answer frequently asked questions. They will add mission education and transparency to our collective financial life..."

"According to the plans approved at the 2007 Conference session, the 11% figure is a Biblical 10% tithe, plus 1% to help us transition to the new system..."

"Our goal is to make sharing our common work simple, straightforward, fair and transparent."

From the second edition:

"One of the best reasons to pay apportionments is this: **they are a bargain.**"

"...we United Methodists purchased certain goods jointly to save cost...[and to make our dollars spent] go farther. Each dollar...'bought' more by being spent jointly with others than it could have if the single local church had used it separately..."

"There is another good reason to pay apportionments. When the Rocky Mountain collection on the total apportionment is, say 83%, that just means that every dollar that all of us do spend on apportionments (even those spent by the churches that contribute 100%) is only worth 83¢ in terms of what it 'buys.'"

Underpayment of apportionments by anyone is a cost to everyone.

"Our 'shared purchasing' agreement is about to become a simple tithe. The Annual Conference will live within its means when and as its churches tithe. If each church forwards its 10% (+1%) each month, the burden to any of us will be modest and the ability of all of us to deliver both our separate and our collective requirements will be in balance."

"That's what I think. WDYT (What Do You Think?) Your comments and questions are welcome!"

RMC Youth Events Get a Rejuvenation!

A look back over the past 30-something years reveals a vital conclusion: Times have changed and so have our youth and their needs. So in order to meet the changing needs of our youth, the CCYM (Conference Council on Youth Ministries) has put together a NEW plan of what Rocky Mountain Conference Youth events will look like.

Up With Youth has had a great run and lots of youth have found meaning and direction to their lives from the great speakers and musical experiences over the years. We celebrate all of the past CORE teams and Conference leadership, but most importantly the YOUTH that made Up With Youth a great success. With the change in times comes a need to refresh and renew our event options. Beginning in the fall of 2008, come find new vigor as REJUVENATION comes our way. Rejuvenation '08 will be an ALL YOUTH event (6th - 12th grade). Rejuvenation will be such a NEW and exciting model of youth events that we can offer Rejuvenation only every other year: in 2008, 2010, 2012, etc. In the odd years (2009, 2011, 2013, etc.), we will look forward to a more regional approach to youth ministry as district/sub-district/cluster events will be highlighted to improve our connection, foster our friendships, and to find ways to meet the needs of youth where they are!

Back to Rejuvenation: Speakers who come from a "middle of the road" United Methodist perspective and great worship will be supplemented with large group and individual destinations (think SPLAT/Youth '07) as well as youth group options in half-day mission projects. Rejuvenation will be a traveling event that will occur in ALL the districts of our Conference. We are looking way outside the Denver metro area for 2008!

This November 2-4 will be our last FALL YLC (Youth Leadership Conference). Beginning in the Spring of 2009, YLC will have a new look. YLC will be a SPRING ALL YOUTH (6th-12th grade) event with leadership-based workshops for youth. Also ADULT workshops will be offered in the area of leadership, youth group development, and programming. In addition to these options YLC will feature legislative-based training (e.g., Roberts Rules, conference leadership, etc.). BUT: how YLC will really differ--other than the time of year--is in its makeup. YLC (beginning in Spring '09) will be limited to five youth (three senior high and two junior high) and two adults from each church. With this new configuration YOUR CHURCH will choose which youth and adults to represent you; which representatives to be trained; and which group to come back to your church and share the learning. This change will offer concentrated ways for your church youth ministry leadership to be trained and to provide that training to the whole youth ministry department AND still serve the needs of those who are chosen to represent you. These great options are provided in ADDITION to the great United Methodist speakers and some wonderful worship bands.

Two RMC Young People to Help Deliver First Young People's Address at General Conference

The Rocky Mountain Conference is blessed to have two of the six young people who will be working together to develop and deliver the first Young People's Address at the 2008 General Conference. And half of the six are from the Western Jurisdiction. Annie Rigo, 28, associate pastor at First UMC, Grand Junction, and Andrew Craig, 15, of Park Hill UMC, were the two chosen from 37 individuals and youth groups that submitted video to be considered. In an article by Linda Green of United Methodist News Service, Andrew, the youngest, said that he hopes the church hears a message "that they are not only being called to act but that they are being called to interact, too," with both young and old. Annie, the oldest, said it is important for General Conference to understand that young people include more than teenagers. "I think the church likes to focus on teenagers and youth groups but does not know how to transition with youth into college and beyond college." The six met with staff of the Division on Ministries With Young People to craft their message in early August, and agreed that the address will "reflect what it means to be a multi-generational church."

The Oct. 2 presentation is on anxiety and depression; the Oct. 9 topic is living with a person who has mental illness, and Oct. 16 is on family relationships. The programs are free.

Hurricanes 2005: 60,000 Helped at Two-Year Mark

Nearly 60,000 individuals have received United Methodist assistance during long-term recovery efforts in the Gulf Coast, according to a recent report issued by United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). "Serving the Least and the Lost" summarizes United Methodist response up to June 30, 2007, to the unprecedented wind and water damage from several large hurricanes in 2005: Dennis, Katrina, Rita, Stan and Wilma. "We're at the two-year mark in our five-year plan of long-term recovery work," said the Rev. Sam W. Dixon, UMCOR interim executive. Issued two years into the response, and near the second anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, the new report details the disbursement of the funds and quantitative results of the assistance to families and individuals in the Gulf Coast as well as international aid. In partnership with Annual Conferences from Texas to Florida, UMCOR has supplied direct assistance and established disaster organizations to assist with long term recovery.
